




Voting Eligibility

To be eligible to vote, a person must be a baptized individual faithful in corporate worship who has received the Sacrament of Holy Eucharist at St. Peter's at least three times during the previous year. In addition, they must sixteen (16) years of age and supporters of St. Peter's through their time, talent, or treasure.

Requirements of Bishop's Committee Members

These are the requirements for eligibility per the Canons:

- 1. At least 18 years of age
- 2. A baptized and confirmed (or received) communicant in the Episcopal Church and a member of the St. Peter's parish
- 3. Have not previously served a full term on the Bishop's Committee within the past 12 months.

These are the expectations to serve on the Bishop's Committee:

- 1. Agree to a three-year consecutive term unless otherwise stated and take a leadership role.
- 2. Attendance at regular and special worship services and parish events.
- 3. Attend all Bishop's Committee meetings (three absences per year allowed) and special Bishop's Committee workshops.
- 4. Be willing to listen, learn and lead.

Junior Warden's Report 2015

Buildings and Maintenance

Your Junior Warden has measured the past year by means of a hundred little missions to keep St. Peter's facilities running smoothly. We've added smoke detectors for our safety and for the peace of mind of our insurance adjustor. The furnaces and restrooms have been tended to. The Mysterious Collapsing Mailbox has been repaired twice. The supports for the paraments for the Season after Pentecost have been reinforced. Door stops have been mended and trash cans have been emptied. It may not always be glamorous, but I've been glad to serve.

Improvements both major and minor are on the horizon for 2016. An Adopt a Bulb campaign will be launching soon. We hope to replace the light bulbs in the worship space with LED bulbs, and we need your help. Even though the bulbs are more expensive than conventional light bulbs, they produce more light and virtually no heat while using very little electricity. The best part is, they last for fifteen to twenty years. Any chance to avoid ladder time is welcome. Additionally, work on installing a new roof on Blackwell Hall and the church will begin soon. Hail damage was found, so the cost to the parish will be minimal, and the benefits will be great. The new appearance and the added protection will put us in good shape for years to come.

I have appreciated your help in both finding and repairing issues around the church. I look forward to continued improvements to our building and grounds as we continue to grow in our love for the Lord and our service to our community.

Grounds, Gardens, Apiary Report 2015

St. Peter's Episcopal Church

Several modifications were made to the St. Peter's Grounds and Gardens in 2015.

Raised beds north of the existing gardens plots were installed for perennial plants including blueberries, strawberries and blackberries. Compost was again used to strengthen the soil nutrients and vegetables that thrived the prior year were replanted. We also installed manual in-ground sprinklers between each plot, which covered the watering of two gardens at once. Ironically the summer was so wet that they were infrequently used, but they will be helpful in the future when summers are dry.

We had two additional community members gardened with us this year. Lyle Miller and Winona Steiner, both Lebanon residents, planted small beds and tended to their crops until the summer rains made it difficult to keep up with weeding. We will offer both a place this year and hope for more participation and moderate rainfall. The cooler, wetter weather made it difficult for certain crops like tomatoes and peppers to ripen. Overall the harvest was still very good, and pollinators (bees and butterflies) were seen everywhere!

I'd like to thank Sandy, Gary, +Fr. Christopher and Kent, for their tireless efforts to keep up with planting, weeding and maintaining the gardens. Special thanks to Gary for his dedication on the mowing crew.



A Bountiful Harvest

The Bee "Corral" was completed and the first two hives, named "Cate" and "Katherine" after our Bishop and Presiding Bishop, were primed and painted. They were then delivered in early spring to Dave Shenefield of Clover Blossom Honey, a commercial beekeeper and our local bee supplier.

On February 28th Gary Sanders, Sandy and I attended the Indiana Beekeepers Conference at Decatur High School along with 897 other beekeepers. It was an amazing event, with standing room only for most training sessions and over 35 onsite vendors of beekeeping supplies. We picked up our 2 nucleus hives (Nuc's) on May 29th, and the "girls" (all 10,000 of them) settled into their new digs very quickly.

Grounds, Gardens, Apiary Report 2015 continued

On June 20th Gary, Sandy and I attended the Purdue Bee Field Day where we learned how to inspect and manage hives under varying circumstances. During the St. Peter's Open House in the fall we gave several apiary tours, including one for three Frankfort High School National Honor Society students. This discussion led to the students using our "Intro to Beekeeping" PowerPoint presentation and gaining permission from the Superintendent and School Board to pursue Beekeeping as a NHS community project. While they will have a local beekeeping mentor, we've agreed to help support them by providing startup assistance and funding through local club grants for both hardware and bees.

Bishop Cate has encouraged us to use this Beekeeping project as a ministry. To help facilitate this, I've enrolled in the University of Montana Master Beekeeping Program. The program is an intensive on-line college 3-year curriculum covering all aspects of bees and Beekeeping. I've successfully completed the first session, Apprentice, late last September and am preparing for the second (Journeyman) session later this fall.

While both hives thrived this year and each carried over 100 pounds of honey into the late fall, the true measure of our success will come early this spring; overwintering honey bees in this climate is a tremendous challenge, and many local hives will not survive the winter. To help their odds, all excess honey stores over 80 pounds were removed and will be returned to them for early spring food resources.

2016 will see new additions to the apiary. With Gary's help, the "Corral" will be lengthened by 12 feet, and 2 new hives ("Mary" and "Martha") are being prepared and will be placed near the existing hives. Bees have been ordered for both St. Peter's and Frankfort HS and will be available in late May. In support of our new tenants, we will be planting 70 pounds of Ladino, White Dutch and Crimson clover in the field. Hopefully this addition will provide a food source for years to come and add color to the north side of the church property.

Good news! Two of the three projects that the Pathways Team identified in 2014 as our priorities have now been completed: the church website was updated with the two main websites being merged into one and a tri-fold brochure has been created which guests with St. Peter's and our mission and various ministries.

You can get to the web page by going to <u>www.stpetersepiscopallebanon.org</u> or the much simpler <u>www.weseegodinyou.org</u>. This also works for any of the affiliated extensions such as .net and .com that we also own.

This completed project will strengthen our visibility to people looking for a church. The majority of people today find a church by looking at websites.

Our third, and major, project is building a labyrinth on the St. Peter's grounds. We have identified a site for our labyrinth on the east side of the church building, to the north of the trees. For "Invite a Friend" Sunday in August, Chuck, Sandy and Josh Dailey spray painted a large labyrinth in that area and then Chuck mowed the paths between the outlines.

Many of our guests and St. Peter's members took the opportunity to walk the labyrinth that day, sometimes accompanied by music from a Native American flute. Children also enjoyed the walking the labyrinth.

The consensus of the Team is to start with paths marked by pavers buried flush with the ground so that the grass can be easily mowed. A budget has been prepared and we are applying for grants to assist with costs.

In the future, this site could be converted to a concrete design. We envision plantings around the labyrinth to offer privacy (Chuck Dailey's dream of a vineyard?), as well as plantings to hide the telephone company's equipment near the road from view. A water fountain would be a hospitable addition for walkers during our humid Indiana weather.

On our 2014 labyrinth tour, we discovered that the labyrinths we visited were not prominently identified. In driving by the location, one would not know that a labyrinth was available. One of our goals is to identify the fact that we have a labyrinth for public use.

One of the next steps in the process is to identify the design and size of the labyrinth. We plan to begin constructing our St. Peter's labyrinth this spring, to be an offering to Lebanon and the surrounding communities as a place of peace and harmony.

Our "God Moment" sharing during the announcement time was a spontaneous project that was born the Sunday before Lent began in 2014 when the Pathways Team agreed that, as part of our Lenten discipline, one of us would share a "God Moment" during the announcements throughout Lent.

Sharing the times in our lives when we feel close to God strengthens the relationships among us. As we continue to share God Moments each Sunday, we become more aware of those sacred times in our lives. I am delighted that our young people regularly and joyfully share God Moments.

As we become comfortable sharing within our congregation, perhaps we will become more comfortable sharing with our friends and acquaintances outside the congregation.

While I could go through all the events of 2015 and itemize them for all of you, that is not my focus today, most of those items have been captured in the outstanding reports that have been prepared by the people who have led the ministries of the church this past year. In the number of parishes I have been in during my formation, I have come to one conclusion regarding the "State of the Parish" address. That is, the best measure of our success in any given year is to look at what we said specifically that we would accomplish, where we are today, and where are we going.

We hosted a very successful Open House and Guest Sunday

What started out of an idea that I read on an Episcopal Church blog, became a highlight and central focus for the year. In the Spring I pitched the idea of an "Invite-A-Friend" to church day and we could possibly have a small reception afterwards. The main thing I told the Bishop's Committee is that we have to get EVERYONE in the parish to commit to inviting and making sure that one new person attended.

As we planned our other events for the Summer Social Calendar, the Parking Lot Eucharists and pizza party, the Parish Picnic. We noticed we gather together the best and with others from our community when there is food involved. So plans began to be developed that we would have an "Open House" and showcase our ministries to the public. This would help meet our goal for 2015 of telling people that "We are Here!"

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Again, our Senior Warden Sandy Dailey stepped up to the plate and organized a YAC day of working on ministry boards that highlight our programs. The Apiary group decided they would give tours of the corral and enough jackets and veils were purchased so we could take groups out there. The Pathways team selected a location for a temporary labyrinth and a painted version was mowed and then lined. Flute music was provided for people who walked the labyrinth that day.

We had 48 in church that Sunday and several more came later in the day. A rousing success by any standard.

We must continue the work started in 2015 and find new ways to reach out in 2016.

There is an old Christian song that some of you might know, with this important refrain, "no one stands alone; where standing side by side; draw the circle, draw the circle wide." I heard another Episcopal clergy person reflect on this song and the image and reflection seems to describe what we have focused on here at St. Peter's.

It seems to me that when we read the Gospels, Jesus' primary message to us his children is that we spend our time in this world helping draw the circle wider. The Jewish world in which Jesus was raised drew a circle around Jewish life only. Everyone else was outside the circle of God's care. Jesus was crucified because he suggested that God's dream is a circle that encompasses all people, all beliefs, and all perspectives. God's love, God's grace, God's forgiveness, includes many more people than we would ever ask or ever imagine. If drawing the circle were left up to me, it would be a small circle. But God draws the circle, and God draws the circle wide. Jesus is calling all of us to the "Draw The Circle Wide" business. I don't just mean this spiritually I mean it literally. I mean God is calling St. Peter's to inviting more and more people into the sphere of God's grace.

There's a problem with drawing circles, however. If you've ever used a compass you know that on one end is the point and the other the pencil. In order to use the pencil end of the compass, the other end, the point, as to have a firm grip. It has to have a sure foundation. In other words, in order for circles to be drawn, especially really wide circles, they must have a strong center.

Yes, Jesus is calling us to draw the circle wide; yet, in order for the circle to be drawn wide we must tend to the center. The vitality of the church's center, in terms of our worship, our commitment to Christ, our biblical awareness, our prayer, our stewardship, determines how wide the circle can be drawn. There has to be something at the center worth sharing, in order for there to be any value in drawing the circle wide.

Perhaps that is why, in my first year and a half at St. Peter's, we have spent some significant time tending to the center of our circle. Let me describe a few ways where we have tended to the center of life here at St. Peter's. Your Bishop's Committee has spent a significant amount of time praying about, and acting on, the desire that we provide more ways for members of St. Peter's to be engaged in ministry and mission at St. Peter's.

We are going to continue being more visible in 2016.

In 2016, we will continue to live and breathe the words of our mission statement:

"A people of prayer uniting in one spirit – connecting caring and community service; holding forth hope and healing for every day life; dancing in the diversity of creation; glorifying in God's wildly inclusive love; and confident in Christ our Lord."

During the last quarter of the year, we started our Card Ministry and we will continue to provide encouragement and celebration for those in our community and those in need. The goal is to let everyone know that they are being remembered at the altar of St. Peter's each day. If you have a friend, neighbor, loved one who stands in need of prayer, you can add their name to our prayer list here at St. Peter's, and if you choose to give us their contact information, we will periodically write to them to remind them that they are being remembered at St. Peter's altar. The care of each other at this church does not happen merely by the presence of the clergy, though that sacramental presence is vital and real for us, it happens when we all care for each other.

One of the new team that I would like to see at St. Peter's is the Worship team. This team would be made up of the clergy, our organist and two other members of the church. I would envision that we meet four times a year, not only to plan our worship together, but also to think of how worship at St. Peter's can be at its best for all people. More to come.

We have been blessed with a generous gift of \$10,000 from the estate of our beloved Shirley Rockstroh. One of the things that Shirley did was ensure our events and happenings were well publicized and that we made ourself known in this community. Part of this money will be used to fund advertisements and other social media marketing in the coming year. We will also plan a garden to invite quiet reflection outside the new window from the family.

So, as you can see, yes, we have been tending to our center here at St. Peter's over the past year. And, we have more tending to do in the years to come, because the circle can't hold unless there is a strong center. Be that as it may, this does not mean that we have neglected Jesus' call to draw the circle wider.

The Dailey's have faithfully fulfilled the responsibility for leading our hospitality efforts this year and has spent numerous hours with the help of many of you to coordinate and facilitate our social gatherings. We will continue to be intentional in planning special times to be together and to celebrate our life in community. As with all of our ministries, we can always use more help. If you feel that you have particular gifts in this area, I am sure that Chuck or Sandy will be happy to enlist your service in the coming year.

Hospitality is not just about throwing a good party. It is about the work that we do each and every week as people come through our doors. It is about the care that we execute for our facility and the surrounding area. It is about expressing an openness to receive others who come among us, unconditionally, with grace, dignity and acceptance. St. Peter's is truly a faithful people in this regard.

You can be a part of any of these ministries and teams. God is calling us individually to draw the circle wider.

I guess if there has been any disappointment for me in this first eighteen months of ministry at St. Peter's, it is the realization that you can't do everything all at once. I have to confess, personally, I have a number of items on my own plate that I would have liked to have further along in the process of development. Yet, I want you to know that I trust God's guidance, I trust God's presence and though God is in charge, my plan is that we have plenty of time to come together.

Financially, we are floating along.

Your Bishop's Committee made the commitment to investing a portion of your money at the Diocesan Offices to help pay the additional costs of a priest in the future. The plan was to withdraw 50% in 2015, 33% in 2016, and 17% in 2017. This would exhaust the \$70,000 we have in the fund. I am happy to stand here and say that for 2015, we did not take one dime from the investment fund and our bank account balance is roughly \$3,500 lower than the beginning of the year. In keeping that money invested at the diocese, we have generated an extra \$8,000 for the future! The plan is still to take 33% (or 24,000) for 2016. I hope to report similar good news next year.

For 2016, we saw an increase of 40% in the number of pledging units and an increase of 25.5% in the amount pledged. Our apportionment to the diocese went up slightly, \$350 per year. However, we are one of the few churches of our size that can say that we paid all of our apportionments on time the entire year! Some are more than a year in arrears. Also we are very thankful to have received notice that we are receiving an extra \$5,000 from the diocese for 2016.

I want to applaud your giving, both pledged and in-kind gifts. We exceeded our projected budget for 2015 and together as we begin to map out our vision forward, we will continue to be resourceful in seeking out new granting opportunities and being careful stewards of the resources that you have so generously blessed St. Peter's with.

When you look at our Statement of Fund Balances, you might think that we have plenty of money. A good portion of that money is earmarked for special projects. Just this week we filed our Mission Strategy request for funds in 2017. We have asked the Diocese of Indianapolis for \$25,000 (the same level of support as 2016) to support our ministries. It may seem strange to talk about 2017 when we are just beginning the new year and approving the new budget, but we need to position ourselves for the growth that has occurred in the eighteen months since I arrived and the growth I hope comes in the next eighteen months. One of the things we listed in our request for funding is support to move me past half-time. A goal that I think many of us share. We will also explore opportunities through the Lilly Grant that the Diocese of Indianapolis received.

Our financial goal this year will be to end the year in the black. I have faith that if each of us will give as we have been blessed and out of our abundance and not out of what is left, we will achieve this goal.

The Pathways team will continue their important work to address our spiritual lives and congregational renewal.

You can read more about it in their report, but the only remaining goal for the Pathways team is the realization of a labyrinth in the East section of our property. We have toured other labyrinths in the area, met with a designer, developed a budget, presented it to the Bishop's Committee and are now working on grants to fund this expense.

During 2015, we were able to have a taped labyrinth for our use during Holy Week and during our Open House we had a painted 30 foot version available on the East Lawn. I hope the educational components and examples have helped us to realize how this is an excellent vehicle for welcome, advertisement and hospitality and will be a resource not only for our congregation but for the entire community. I am delighted to consider this possibility considering the abundant resources of land that we have that are not presently being used.

It is my hope that in 2016, we will continue to do what we do well and we will continue to embrace challenges and opportunities in prayer and with faith, welcoming conversation and discernment of God's Spirit, as we seek guidance and direction in fulfilling our vision and mission.

St. Peter's Episcopal Church is your church home and this is your family. That being said, within any social construct care is required by not just a few, but by all the people. When such care is given the people don't just survive, they thrive. I believe that we can thrive in new ways in 2016, but we all have to be willing to give our very best, not just once a month or when it is convenient, but each and every week.

Jesus blesses us in life, through life and with life eternal. Are we seriously not able to afford Jesus an hour or so of our time each week in community, in service, in truly walking in the light of Christ and seeking his guidance?

So we move forward from this year to the next remembering the mission to which we are called by no one less than Jesus Christ, "no one stands alone; where standing side by side; draw the circle, draw the circle wide."

I am blessed and honored to be your priest. In thanksgiving for all of you.
