Bringing home palms

The Great Liturgy of Holy Week is a sequence of individual liturgies that make up one continuous act of worship beginning with Palm Sunday and ending at Easter with each liturgy blending into the next over the course of the week. This is why there is no blessing or benediction at the end of each liturgy until the first Easter celebration.

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The Liturgy of the Palms

The People assemble in the Gathering Area near the kitchen.

The Reading of the Palm Sunday Gospel

(Year A: Matthew 21.1-11, Year B: Mark 11.1-11a, Year C: Luke 19.29-40)

The Blessing of the Palms

The Priest: The Lord be with you.

The People: And also with you.

The Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

The Priest: It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you redeemed us

through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed King of kings by those who spread garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy

Spirit, now and for ever.

The Palms are distributed among the people.


The Procession of Palms


The Same before the baptismal font recalls our baptism into Christ's death and resurrection.

The Offering of Our Lives and of Our Gifts back to God



The people stand while the offerings are gathered and placed on the Altar and sing:



Our Great Thanksgiving Prayer to God

The people remain standing. The Presider, whether bishop or priest, faces them and sings:



Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, through Jesus Christ our Lord. For our sins he was lifted high upon the cross, that he might draw the whole world to himself; and, by his suffering and death, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who put their trust in him. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith: Presider and People
Christ has died.
Christ is risen.
Christ will come again.

The Presider continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

on earth as in heaven.



The People respond: Amen.


The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation.

The Communion Meditation in Music

"Agnus Dei" by Samuel Barber

In place of a communion hymn we will be listening to a choral setting of "O Lamb of God" during communion set to the well known orchestral, "Adagio for Strings," by Samuel Barber. Sung in Latin, it gradually expands to an intense "Dona nobis pacem" (Give us peace) and then returns to a meditative mode. The text is as follows: Agnus (Lamb) Dei (of God), qui (who) tolis (takes away) pecatta (the sins) mundi (of the world), Miserere (Have mercy) nobis (on us). Dona (Give) nobis (us) pacem (peace).
